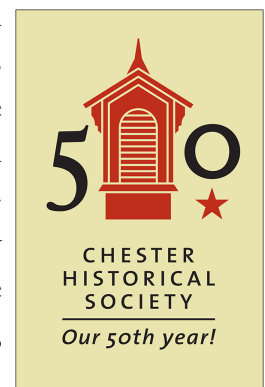

President's Message

It was a year like nothing in memory, when plans and personal contact were put on hold.

Before the arrival of COVID-19 in mid-March 2020, the Society had welcomed large audiences to our series of impressive exhibits and unique programs. From our summertime 50th Anniversary Exhibit and Chester Fair Farm Exhibit, to our big band nights and four well-attended programs, we had a very full calendar, attracting 2,855 people.

Leading into the 100th anniversary year of Woman's Suffrage, we were excited about creating a seasonal exhibit, hosting programs to celebrate Chester women in the years before 1920, and continuing to share the story of Constance Baker Motley. Until the pandemic shut us down.

But history doesn't stand still and neither did we.

Building on the success of the Light Up the Night stars holiday fundraiser, we turned it into an opportunity to help the community during the pandemic. From the start of March to the end of May, our Stars for Hope sales raised over \$4,000 for Adams food cards for families in need in Chester and Deep River. Our star creator, Christopher Owens, along with trustee (and star organizer) Dawn Parker, made the news time and again, including WFSB-TV, bringing Chester and the Society much recognition.

We took advantage of the museum closure to check off some projects in our long-term museum maintenance program, replacing the roof shingles and installing improved gutters, and replacing the cupola spire.

Now we look forward to producing more films of Chester history for our YouTube channel – a project we began this summer when we couldn't open our museum – and publishing another book of Chester history this fall. Perhaps founding President Barbara Delaney's favorite Society closing remarks are never more appropriate. "Onward and Upward."

The timeline is bookended by the Society's original and 50th anniversary logos, representing the side door at the Meeting House and the cupola atop Chester Museum at The Mill.


Exhibits & Programs

Our 2019 seasonal exhibit focused on celebrating the CHS's 50th Anniversary. Creating this exhibit, it was amazing to realize how much we have achieved. From rehabilitating and expanding the Meeting House, starting the Robbie Collomore Music Series, and ultimately creating a museum, there was a great deal to exhibit. Sandy and Marilena Vaccaro divided our history into decades and turned them into five beautiful panels. Craftworks, Collomore Concerts, Galas, Collaborations, Oral Histories, Books, Videos, Creative Challenges... Oh my, we've been a very active society.

The exhibit also included 50 years of dynamic and creative posters designed by Jan Cummings and Peter Good for CHS events and programs, plus Collomore concerts and Meeting-house Players productions.


June's Annual Meeting in the Meeting House adjourned to the Green for a potluck picnic, 50th Anniversary Cake, and music by the Moving Target Band in the gazebo. The Old Time baseball game, played by 1857 rules, with the Deep River and Essex Historical Societies in September, was another big hit, particularly as the Chester Squirrels prevailed.

The fall was especially busy with three big programs, plus three evenings of music by the Tuxedo Junction Big Band in the Meeting House. In September Chester resident Al Malpa, a longtime ephemera collector and dealer, gave a PowerPoint program, "Ephemera Discoveries in Chester's Collection." On a Sunday afternoon in October, we co-hosted with Deep River Historical Society a showing of Peter Calamari's "Films of Deep River and Chester, 1930s-1950s," at the Deep River Town Hall Auditorium. November brought a program by Jan Cummings and Peter Good, "50 Years of Chester Graphics by Cummings & Good." All

three programs were very popular, attracting large audiences, and were filmed for our YouTube channel.

We welcomed a crowd at our "Chester in the 1950s" program in March, presented in our ever popular cracker-barrel format. Two weeks later, COVID-19 arrived, cancelling our great program on the 100th anniversary of women's suffrage in CT and our exhibit on notable women of Chester before 1920. Everything is on the back burner, waiting for the all clear.

The pandemic also forced Trustee Marta Daniels to cancel Joel Motley's showing of his new documentary about his mother, Judge Constance Baker Motley. Marta also had to cancel at least six speaking engagements around the state about Judge Motley.

Historical Preservation

The History Preservation Committee is responsible for the Society's collections, for accessioning new items, as well as cataloging and preserving the collection.

We accepted many donations this year, including items from the Chalany Farm on Cedar Lake Road from the Chalany family. These were displayed at the 2019 Chester Fair. Two plows are now exhibited outdoors at the Museum. Another donation, a large Time Clock used at Russell Jennings, is now part of our permanent exhibition. Bruce Sypher donated a special table he made from the original subfloor boards of the 1795 Meeting House.

For the first time, we decided to purchase an important item for our collection. We felt very fortunate to pay less than \$200 on eBay for a ledger from the Silliman factory, covering all transactions from November 1867 to December 1881.

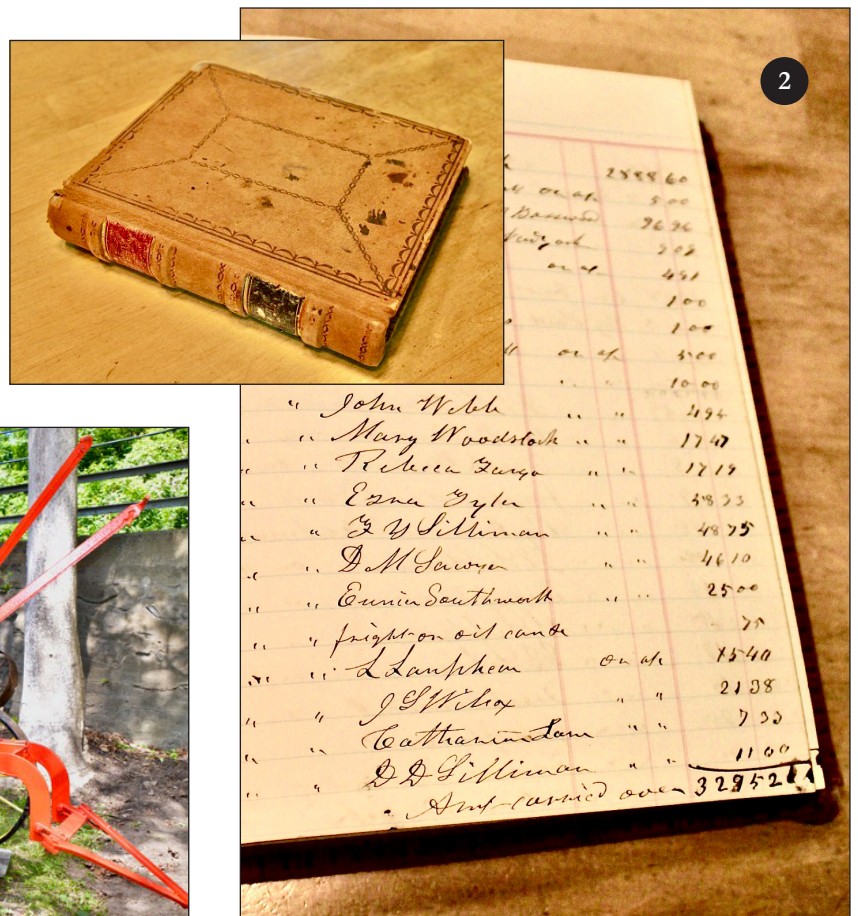
Pat Kosky and I continued to work most Tuesday afternoons and Friday mornings in the Meeting House Archive Room. We thank Hannah Male, who joined us October through March. The Archive Room was closed from mid-February through late May because of floor replacement at the Meeting House, then COVID-19. Once the virus is behind us, we will welcome new volunteers. We meet Tuesday afternoons and Friday mornings.

We work with the Exhibit and Refresh Committees, researching records, photographs and artifacts in our collection to put on display. We research questions from Society members and others who find us online. We also scan photographs for our collection, which allows families to retain their originals. We welcome photos for a Tri-Town public program, "Celebrating 100 years of Women's Achievements," presently scheduled for November.

Clockwise: (1) This 3-foot-high wooden clock with a stamp for timecards was used at Russell Jennings Manufacturing beginning in 1923. Its manufacturer, International Time Recording Co. of NY, was a forerunner of International Business Machines (IBM). (2) A listing on eBay for an S. Silliman & Co. ledger for the period 1867-1881, prompted the Society to acquire this significant addition to our collection. Building & Grounds

The Society's 5-Year (2018-2022) Strategic Plan, adopted November 14, 2017, established the Building & Grounds Committee. The committee's role is to help the trustees prioritize and prepare a maintenance plan for short- and long-term projects for 3-to-5-year budget planning. In addition, committee members perform the routine building and grounds tasks necessary to maintain the safety and quality of the Mill property.

The "Preserve the Mill – Secure its Future" campaign has identified nine essential infrastructure projects for implementation. During the past year, four of the projects were completed. These were: (1) Phase II HVAC system installed in a new code-compliant first floor utility room replacing the old system in the east-side attic; (2) Replacement of roof shingles; (3) Replacement of old gutters with leaf guard gutters and a new gutter system along south-side eave; (4) Creation of the replica spire by Art Christianson's excellent craftsmanship. The last three projects were partially funded by a \$5000 grant from the 1772 Foundation in cooperation with Preservation CT.

We also replaced several courses of deteriorated clapboard along the deck side of the Mill, which is now protected by new gutters.

Finally, in May the committee prepared the area along the driveway for the location of the Chalany plow. A section was graded and gravel stone base set to accommodate this unique gift.

Development & Fundraising

During this fiscal year, the Development Committee focused on expanding the investment diversity of the two brokerage accounts established by CHS. The goal is to expand and maintain conservative financial assets that will retain value and grow during these uncertain and volatile times.

The committee conducted their annual fiduciary function of reviewing with the brokers the performance of both brokerage firms, Essex Financial Services and Wells Fargo. Both accounts performed within the established objectives. Ongoing monitoring and allocation adjustments were made during the year.

Exceptional value yields in 2019 for the two mutual funds resulted in a one-year balance increase of 26.8% as of 12/31/2019. The subsequent four months of early 2020 brought a dramatic market downturn due to COVID-19. However, by the end of the fiscal year, all of the various investment accounts returned to or close to year-end 2019 levels.

Currently, CHS has two mutual funds, a balanced fund with stocks and bonds included, a preferred securities portfolio and a money market account. The value of these accounts as of fiscal year end was \$278,694.

A portion of these invested funds have been allocated to program, publication, educational and museum restoration expenses. Ongoing costs for maintaining the historic Mill and the grounds are an expensive obligation, requiring long-range planning and fiscal oversight efforts by the CHS trustees.



Following the installation of new roof shingles and gutters at the museum, member Art Christianson crafted a handsome spire to top the cupola, replicating the historic one that fell a few years ago.

During this year, the Development Committee also worked with the Building & Grounds Committee to develop a four-year fundraising campaign, "Preserve the Mill – Secure its Future," to be launched in 2020. Due to COVID-19, however, this fundraising effort has been delayed. The trustees do not want to impose donation requests on the residents of Chester during this period of financial stress.

Nevertheless, we were able to undertake some primary museum repairs and improvements, thanks to some prudent financial planning and a \$5000 grant from Preservation CT. (More details in the Building & Grounds report.)

The annual Creative Challenge silent auction and reception was also postponed until 2021. The delay of these fundraising activities and unknown future pandemic impact cause concern and require close monitoring of financial obligations.

The one fundraiser we did offer was our "Light Up the Night" star sale, which began in late November. Chester resident Christopher Owens created prelighted wooden stars, which we sold to raise funds for the upgrade of exterior lighting at the museum. By the end of winter, we had sold 85 stars, raising a profit of \$3350. (This star sale should NOT be confused with the "Stars for Hope" sale to raise funds for the Food Pantry during COVID-19. See the President's Message for more details on that.)

Membership

As of May 31, 2020, the Society had 260 current memberships (see back page), the sixth consecutive year we increased our membership rolls. We welcomed 18 new memberships and processed three upgrades. By level, we currently have 50 Individual memberships (10 new), 95 Family (8 new), 27 Benefactor (1 upgrade) and 88 Life (2 upgrades).

Our efforts to attract more members was thwarted by the March arrival of the COVID-19 virus, shutting down all programs and exhibits, prime activities to stimulate interest in Chester history.

A vital membership is the foundation of any successful non-profit organization. A goal set in our Strategic Plan

is to identify ways to bring more people into our annual membership program as well as increase interest in volunteer opportunities. We encourage members to set a goal of inviting a friend to a future event.

We encourage all members as well as non-members to stay current by signing up for our informative periodic e-newsletter. Other than the Society-associated Robbie Collomore Music Series, we do not share email lists with other organizations.

Review & Refresh Committee

With its continued enhancements, our award-winning "permanent" exhibit is worth visiting again and again.

Robbie Collomore Music Series

The 45th season of the Robbie Collomore Music Series was both an artistic and financial success. The All in the Fall grouping of concerts again proved to be popular with a record attendance.

The first concert of the season was our annual Barbara and Edmund Delaney Young Artist Concert, featuring the Ansonia String Quartet. This concert continued our association with Juilliard, affording us the opportunity to hear brilliant musicians at the start of their career.

The second concert featured Hubby Jenkins, who wove a magical story of Afro-American music through country blues, ragtime, fiddle, banjo and traditional jazz.

In November we featured the legendary John Jorgenson Bluegrass Band. The four musicians combined incredible vocal harmonies and seasoned showmanship.

Our final concert was very special, featuring world-renowned artists, cellist Carter Brey and pianist Benjamin Pasternack. Their exquisite playing was a fitting close to our season.

The only sad note was the onset of COVID-19, which has forced us to cancel our 2020 season. Happily all our performers have agreed to return for our 2021 season.

Finances

Revenues for the annual operations of the Society are generated from three primary sources: membership dues, donations (Annual Appeal, museum visitor box, other) and fundraising events. Principal expenses include utilities, insurance and accounting, general maintenance and exhibit expenses.

Our Annual Appeal response realized almost \$12,000 with just under 50% of our membership participating. With all mortgage-type obligations now behind us, we were able to direct \$3,900 to initial repairs and maintenance identified in an upcoming capital campaign. A profit of \$3,350 from stars sold during the Light Up the Night wintertime program was similarly directed.

A rising stock market and more customers voting for the Society as a favorite charity resulted in a \$1660 donation from the Essex Saving Bank's Community Investment Program. We also received a \$700 corporate grant from Essex Savings Bank / Essex Financial Services to offset creating and mailing newsletters. Both amounts were far above previous experience and much appreciated.

The 2020-21 fiscal year will present new challenges as we will lose donations and publication sales from visitors to the museum, the Chester Sunday Market and the Chester Fair. Our new budget is conservative, attempting to reflect these uncertain times while relying on the continuing support of our loyal membership.

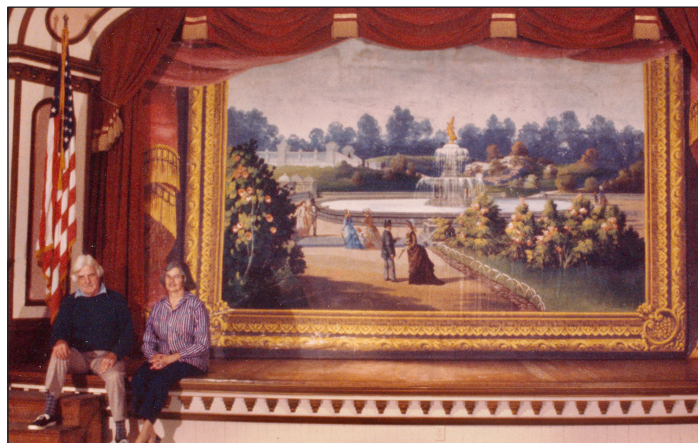
