President's Message

This was a year of growth for the Chester Historical Society. With the threat of Covid on our gatherings essentially gone, we had an active summer at the Chester Museum and a busy fall schedule of programs at the Meeting House. Social media helped us connect with an increasing number of people, including Chester natives throughout the country who engaged in our online auctions, shared their memories and sent us Chester memorabilia from faraway places. (One donor even drove here from Florida with a box of items left by the late Adelaide Bushnell and her mother.)

Our digital outreach includes our films on YouTube, now up to 32 and growing. We are grateful to Jon Claude Haines for his filming and editing and to Donald Perreault, who added a new short film in his "Treasures from the Collection" series this year.

Educating youths in Chester history continues to be a high priority for the Society. Following on the success of their first year of summer programming for elementary school-aged children, the Youth Education Committee has planned a second summer program as well as entertained children during Earth Day and hosted a springtime meeting of Tri-Town Cub Scout Pack 13 and their parents.

The Development Committee, chaired by Jenny Kitsen and including members from the Chester community and board members, is making a difference, despite the stock market ups and downs. Later in this report you will read of the continued increases in membership and participation in our Annual Appeal. All good news!

Despite our fondness for digital media, we still believe in printed book publishing. As this summer begins, we will be introducing Nathan Jacobson's book about the mill dams of Chester (see Publications report). Speaking of dams....

We're very excited about a new exhibit in progress. Soon, visitors will be able to interact with an 86" screen to touch, explore and discover "The Pattaconk and its Mills."

Along the Pattaconk Brooks' twin branches, there were 20 sites where, primarily in the 1800s, more than 75 businesses used the adjacent waterpower to manufacture a wide diversity of goods. The full exhibition experience will be implemented in stages. Initial viewing is targeted for late June or July.

We are grateful to Nathan L. Jacobson & Associates for making this touchscreen exhibit possible. In celebrating its 50-year anniversary, the firm donated \$17,500 for this project to honor its founder Nate Jacobson and his longtime curiosity, research and knowledge of Chester's early dams, mills and industries and the impact they had on the town's development.

As an all-volunteer non-profit organization that is not part of the Town Budget, we are ever thankful for strong community support. We invite you to visit us online or in the museum.

Exhibits & Programs

In June 2022 we opened a new seasonal exhibit (photo at right), named "Where We Ate; Where We Eat," featuring photos and stories from Chester restaurants, past and present. We were pleased the exhibit sparked restaurant memories and donations of additional restaurant memorabilia from visitors.

The Chester Fair exhibit (below) showcased new acquisitions as well as highlights from the restaurant exhibit. Thanks to our curator, Diane Lindsay, for her expertise and assistance.



We had a busy schedule of programs, beginning in June following our Annual Membership Meeting, when Jon Joslow led a program, "Show & Tell: Building Our Chester Collection," with Diane Lindsay. Three new gifts to the Collection were presented by their donors and Diane and Jon explained how important these and others are to the continuing growth of the Collection.



On a beautiful Sunday afternoon in August, Michael Hotkowski, a sea chantey performer at the Griswold Inn and Chester resident, sang sea chanteys and narrated at the Meeting House Gazebo. More than 100 people enjoyed the performance.

Eric Hesselberg, author of the new book, *Night Boat to New York*, gave a lively illustrated talk on the history of steamboats on the Connecticut River on Oct. 2. This program was co-sponsored with Deep River Historical Society.

An enlightening and informative panel discussion, "Chester Dams: Treasure or Trouble," with six experts on the subject, was presented by the Historical Society in collaboration with Chester Land Trust and Chester Conservation Commission, on Oct. 16.

Programs were taped by Jon Claude Haines for our You-Tube channel, which can be accessed through our website. As always, we encourage your ideas for future programs and exhibits.

Youth Education Committee

The Youth Education Committee is a new committee whose goal is to help develop and pass on a love of history, especially Chester's history, to young people who will one day become the "stewards" of the precious history of our unique town. We aim to teach children about Chester in ways that will be fun, interesting, interactive and relevant.

For our first year, we offered four day-long programs at the Chester Museum during July and August. We had fourteen children, ranging in age from 6 to 11. The days (see cover) consisted of exploring the museum; doing mini-history lessons with related crafts, activities and games; and even baking homemade bread. To conclude the summer program, we invited families and friends to an exhibit so the children could "show off" what they had done and learned. The program was successful thanks to a dedicated, hard-working committee, plus amazing support from many other Society members. We are currently preparing for this summer's program.

This spring we hosted a tour of the museum for the Cub Scouts of Chester, Deep River and Essex along with their leaders and families. Their visit also included a history of street names (below) in Chester. In April we offered Earth Day crafts for children during Chester's Earth Day Celebration.

Constance Baker Motley Special Collection Archive

Established in 2020, the Chester Historical Society's Constance Baker Motley Special Collection Archive gathers, writes and distributes materials on Motley's life in Chester, fields inquiries, undertakes educational programs, hosts book talks, and promotes her legacy.

Constance Baker Motley, a pioneering Civil Rights leader who had a home in Chester for 40 years, was nominated for a Congressional Gold Medal, the nation's highest civilian award for distinguished contributions to American history. Only 173 have been awarded since 1776; Motley will join Martin Luther King, Rosa Parks, Robert Frost, Jonas Salk and the Little Rock Nine. A Congressional vote is pending.

Residents can learn more about Motley's legacy and her Chester history by accessing the Society's three new web pages (www.chesterhistoricalsociety.org) created in response to interest generated by the Gold Medal nomination and Motley's 2022 biography, *Civil Rights Queen*, by Tomiko Brown-Nagin.

CT Freedom Trail directional highway signs on Route 148 at Cedar Lake Road will soon guide tourists to the Constance Baker Motley State Historic Site, one of 162 on the Trail, marking major Black contributions to freedom. The Society assisted the Chester Land Trust (site owner) in obtaining these valuable DOT tourist signs guiding visitors to Motley's former home and public Preserve with its popular Little Rock Nine Hiking Trail.

An outdoor Little Rock Nine Trail plaque providing an account of Constance Motley's 1957 landmark school desegregation case was written by the Society. Public dedication of the Trail and plaque will occur in September, CT Freedom Trail month.

Having written the original application placing Constance Motley's former property on the CT Freedom Trail, the Society has been a representative to it, along with the Land Trust, since 2018. From inception, the two organizations have collaborated to promote Constance Motley in Chester.

Robbie Collomore Concert Series

The 2022 Robbie Collomore Concert series was wonderfully successful. The houses were full, with two sold-out concerts, and audience members were full of raves and congratulations.

Sterling Elliott, cello, and Wynona Wang, piano, gave a virtuosic recital on September 18 with a program of Joseph Suk, Brian Nabors, Saint-Saëns, and Shostakovich. Jazz pianist Emmet Cohen and his trio gave a superb, sold-out concert on October 9. The Noree Chamber Soloists presented an unusual performance of a Mozart piano concerto arranged for piano quintet, plus works by Schubert and Dvorak, on November 6. And we closed the season with jazz guitarist Stephane Wrembel's band, who brought the house down at a sold-out concert on November 20.

This concert series is funded in part by the Burton Cornwall Cultural Endowment Fund under the auspices of the Chester Historical Society. 

Publications

As our year closes, we are thrilled to be publishing Nathan Jacobson's new book, *The Streams, Mill Dams and Mills of Chester*, in June. Nate worked on this book for several years at the request of the late Richard Spencer (Chester native and son of noted photographer Hugh Spencer). No one knows Chester dams better than Nate, a Chester native and founder of Nathan L. Jacobson & Associates in the town center. With historical photos, plus many new images of the 20 mill dams in our town, this is a very interesting publication.

Efforts are underway to produce a new edition of Chester's *Houses* book. The last edition (published in 1984) featured 180 houses built up to the year 1875. The new book will include all those homes, with updates and photos, as well as houses built up to and during 1900. Another book we plan to update in the near future is *Kate Silliman's Chester Scrapbook*.

Hidden for nearly 150 years, the 1876 Meeting House floor is now up for all to see at the Meeting House. With the restored chalk signatures and a message ('Compliments to future generations') from Thomas Cook Silliman and William N. Clark, the section was saved during the floor replacement, then restored by Art Christianson.

Historic Preservation

The Historic Preservation Committee is responsible for the Society's collections, for accessioning new items, cataloging and preserving the collection.

Pat Kosky and I continue to work most Tuesday afternoons and Friday mornings in the Meeting House Archives. Recent installation of new lighting in our basement space is greatly appreciated. We welcome anyone who would be interested in joining us.

We work with the Exhibition Committee, finding photos, ephemera and objects in our collection for exhibits. We research questions from Society members, newspaper writers, authors and others. We often scan photos for our collection, which allows families to retain their originals.

We had many donations this year including a box of Silliman items from a Silliman descendant and the Samuel Carlos Silliman blanket chest. We received Chester postcard collections from Don Rankin and Tom Sypher. Also, a native stone hoe, items from the George C. Emmons Insurance Agency, tools from Russell Jennings and Middlesex Handle Company, autograph books of Marie Yenowich (1940s) and Florence Berg (1920s), Estelle Watrous Foster's 1900 diary, and a Flamboozle game, invented by Peter Good and Ted Leavitt.

Diane Lindsay, Curator

Building & Grounds

The Building and Grounds committee is responsible for maintaining the 3,250-sq.ft. Mill building and outside exhibits landscape area, gravel driveway and parking spaces. Routine building care includes services for HVAC systems, security and fire alarms, elevator, propane, electrical, water and sewer utilities.

In July we met with DOT engineers for assistance in reducing the excessive drainage on West Main Street, which often erodes the Mill's driveway. Their solution installing a new catch basin, curbing and sidewalk "not an easy or inexpensive fix" - is further complicated by the driveway's private ownership and easements providing access to five properties. The paving stones and millings installed by Patrick McGannon, the Society's landscape contractor, are practical solutions that have improved the entrance surface.

In August, the Mill's alarm equipment was inspected, cleaned and tested with all systems working properly. In September, the museum's first floor track lights were replaced with efficient low-cost LED bulbs; at one hour use per day, each light's cost is only \$1.10 per year! Fall activities included leaves and brush clean-up, the planting of a dogwood tree in the reclaimed lawn area below the Mill's street sign and installing protective covers for the millstones and Chalany plow.

In February, DEEP notified the Society that our property map showing the southwest corner of the building at 1ft. 7in. from the boundary line indicates this area and adjacent downstream wall are part of Griswold Pond Dam #2 and the responsibility of the Society. In March a TEAMS meeting with DEEP was held to discuss clarification of dam ownership and status of maintenance. We have submitted to DEEP photos of the dam's high and low water events and maps of three properties adjacent to the dam.

In April, the Mill's annual HVAC maintenance inspection was done. In May the landscape contractor did a spring clean-up of planting beds and lawn area and planted annuals in the old trough. Also completed in May was the installation of the 86" LED touch screen in the first floor exhibit space.

Financials - Annual Operations

Revenues for the annual operations budget of the Society are generated from three primary sources: membership dues, the Annual Appeal and fundraising events. Principal expenses include utilities, insurance, accounting, contracted services, general maintenance and exhibitions / programs.

Our Annual Appeal realized \$23,000, setting a new high for the fifth consecutive year. Nearly 50% of our membership participated! We are extremely grateful for these donations, which now account for over half of our operating revenue. The ability to return to post-Covid fundraising activities increased revenue as well.

Essex Savings Bank continues to be a benefactor. Customer voting for the Society as a favorite charity resulted in an \$1800 donation. We have also benefited from an Essex Savings Bank / Essex Financial Services corporate grant to offset the postage of mailing newsletters and annual reports.

Our 2023-24 budget is conservative. Our stewardship practice is to budget for maintenance reserves and transfer any year-end surplus to the same, hopefully minimizing the need for frequent capital fundraising. Painting the museum's exterior and replacing the roof are two prominent recent examples of our practice.

Development Committee

During these ongoing uncertain economic times, the Development Committee has closely monitored and evaluated the performance of the Society's two investment accounts. One account is with Charles Schwab and the other is with Essex Financial.

The committee met twice this past year with each financial advisor to conduct analysis of the holdings in each account. Due to the continued volatility in the economy, adjustments were made during the year to move more money into CDs to secure stable revenue. Modifications were made to the equity holdings for wider diverse distribution of funds. As of May 2023, the combined value of both accounts was \$551,477, with the equity holdings 65% of the combined portfolios and the remaining 35% in CDs or money market holdings (fixed income).

The Annual Appeal topped \$23,000 far surpassing prior year's contributions. The Board of Trustees expresses their sincere appreciation to all the individuals and organizations that continue to support the Historical Society.
